MATH 6321, THEORY OF FUNCTIONS OF A REAL VARIABLE- PART II.

Course Description: Emphasis will be placed on a thorough understanding of the basic concepts of modern analysis as well as developing problem solving skills in applications. Topics covered include: Hilbert spaces; Banach spaces; elements of functional analysis; Fourier series and transforms; and elements of distribution theory. These notions will be examined through examples and applications, especially to probability, ergodic theory and physics.

Lecture notes will be comprehensive and the books listed above are for reference. The book by Richard Bass will be available as a pdf file. The course assumes an understanding of analysis at the level of Principles of Real Analysis (any edition) by Walter Rudin and a knowledge of measure theory.

Assessment:

There will be one midterm (worth 30%), a final exam (40 %), as well as approximately 4 take-home problem sheets (30% for the total of all problem sheets). Not all the questions on the take-home problem sheets will be graded- a subsection of the

questions will be randomly chosen and graded. The grade on the take-home problem sheet will be based on this graded subsection.
