1. (1 point) Write the following permutation as a product of transpositions. Determine whether it is odd or even.

$$\begin{pmatrix} 1 & 2 & 3 & 4 & 5 & 6 & 7 & 8 & 9 & 10 & 11 & 12 & 13 & 14 & 15 \\ 11 & 5 & 14 & 10 & 6 & 15 & 12 & 13 & 1 & 7 & 8 & 4 & 9 & 2 & 3 \end{pmatrix}.$$

2.

- (a) (1 point) Let G be a group and $a, b \in G$. Let $a \sim b$ hold if and only if there exists $x \in G$ such that $a = xbx^{-1}$. Prove that \sim is an equivalence relation.
- (b) (1 point) For integers x, y , let $x \sim y$ hold if and only if $11x - 3y$ is an integer multiple of 8. Prove that \sim is an equivalence relation.

3. (1 point) Let n be a positive integer. Let x, y be integers. We say that x, y are congruent mod n (written $x \equiv y \pmod{n}$) if $x - y$ is an integer multiple of n . Prove that this defines an equivalence relation on the integers.

4. (2 points) Let p, q be two prime numbers, and let G be a group of order pq . Show that every subgroup H of G with $H \neq G$ is cyclic.

5. (2 points) Let G be a group of order p^2 , where p is a prime. Prove that G must have a subgroup of order p .

6. (2 points) Let G be a group. Let H, K be subgroups of G . Assume that $\#H = 12$ and $\#K = 17$. Prove that $H \cap K = \{e\}$.
